'I nailed 'hemp' box for Madam Johnson

AN Ijero corpenter in Ebute Metta, Mr. Julius Abosede, told a Lagos Magistrate court yesterday at the resumed hearing in Madam Johnson's Indian Hemp case that he nailed the wooden box said to have contained Indian hemp, dried fish and pepper for Madam Johnson on November 11 and she paid "me 6d for my job".

He was giving evidence for the prosecution at the trial of a wealthy trader, 59-year-old Madam Angelina Ibijoke Johnson charged with exporting 15lbs of Indian hemp to the United Kingdom without a Customs permit.

Earlier, the court had delayed proceeding for about one hour when none of the four defence counsel was in court.

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At 10.15 a.m., the court resumed and a new counsel, Mr. O. Oluwole announced that he was holding brief for Mr. E. A. Thomas one of the four defence counsel who failed to put in appearance. rance.
